This CEMR-PLATFORMA public webinar on the post-2030 sustainable development framework, hosted within the PLATFORMA 2030 Agenda and Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs) cluster and the CEMR Impact Community Society, aims to bring together different stakeholders to explore priorities for sustainable development beyond the current SDGs framework. The discussion will focus on emerging global challenges and lessons learned from SDG implementation. - This study has been conducted in partnership with AIMF and PLATFORMA. It examines how cities are increasingly shaping international cooperation and addressing global challenges such as climate change, migration, and sustainable development through decentralized cooperation and city diplomacy. Based on survey data from 54 cities and field research in Benin and Madagascar, the study finds that effective international cooperation depends mainly on long-term trust, local ownership, and sustained engagement and less on the number of partnerships. It also highlights the growing importance of city networks and South–South cooperation, while noting that financial and institutional constraints continue to limit cities’ global action.
